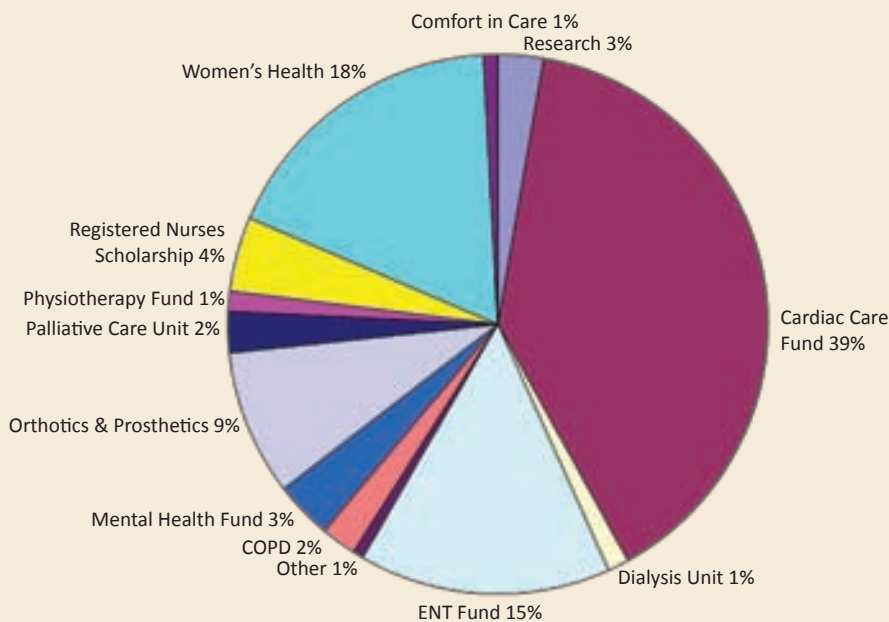

Working together . . . To Help Our Hospitals

In 2008-2009, the Health Care Foundation, through the support of our donors, provided more than \$1.1 million to the Eastern Health Authority to enhance patient care at the General Hospital, St. Clare's Mercy Hospital, the Waterford Hospital, Dr. L.A. Miller Centre and the Dr. W. Templeman Centre, Bell Island. This money was used to purchase modern medical equipment and technology, fund patient comfort and care items, and support health scholarships and research. How We Work

Every year, we consult with the Eastern Health Authority to determine the highest priorities in medical equipment needs for the five adult hospitals we support. This ensures your donations will have the greatest impact.

You always have the option of choosing which hospital, or area of care, you wish to support. Donations may also be directed to purchase patient comfort items, through our *Comfort in Care* program, or to support our existing research and scholarship grant programs.

Our annual fundraising goals are achieved through special events held on our behalf, direct mail appeals, our annual hospital home lottery, and support from individuals, businesses and service groups. As well, our hospitals and patients benefit from bequests, endowments and in memoriam gifts made to the Health Care Foundation.

Working together . . .

To Help Fund Modern Equipment

How Your Gifts Helped in 2008-2009

Your donations go to work to support patient care across the five hospitals and health centres we support. Here are a few examples of the items that were purchased through your generosity:

CARDIAC & CRITICAL CARE is provided at the General Hospital and St. Clare's Mercy Hospital. These hospitals provide specialized cardiac and critical care services for the entire province.

- Two High Resolution Digital Ultrasound Systems
- Technology and software to upgrade diagnostic equipment to digital compatibility for image storage and distribution, and workstations to review images.

PALLIATIVE CARE is provided in most hospitals and long-term care facilities. In St. John's, the Dr. L.A. Miller Centre has a specialized Palliative Care Unit.

- Purchase of beds and comfort items for the Palliative Care Unit.

MEDICINE (COPD) treats patients with chronic obstructive pulmonary disease, a debilitating disease that makes it very difficult for people to breathe. Thanks to a donation from the NL Lung Association, a Pulmonary Rehabilitation Program was established at St. Clare's Mercy Hospital to assist people with COPD live a better quality life.

- Purchase of exercise equipment for the Pulmonary Rehab Program.

ENT is a specialty area that diagnoses and treats disorders of the ears, nose, and throat. The ENT program of Eastern Health is the provincial referral centre for specialized ENT care and all ENT oncology cases.

- A computer image-guided navigation system for the operating room at St. Clare's. This technology enables ENT specialists to perform minimally-invasive surgery in the delicate endosinus region.



REHABILITATION TECHNOLOGY DIVISION services for the entire province are provided at the Dr. L.A. Miller Centre. The division's workshop provides custom prosthetic and orthotic adaptive devices such as artificial limbs, braces, custom footwear and adaptive seating.

- Helped to fund a complete refit and renovation of the Orthotic & Prosthetic workshop. (Refer to Page 5 for story).

MENTAL HEALTH services at Eastern Health are as far-reaching in scope as mental illness and addiction is in our communities, and its services are located at various hospital and community sites.

- Through the support of Waterford Hospital staff, we continue a long tradition of providing Christmas gifts to patients of that facility.
- Through a partnership with Eli Lilly Canada, we awarded 11 Moving Lives Forward Scholarships to provide funding for mental health clients pursuing post-secondary education.

PHYSIOTHERAPY services are provided throughout most of Eastern Health's facilities. St. Clare's Mercy Hospital offers specialized physiotherapy care to help rehabilitate patients who have had orthopedic surgery.

- Purchase of a treadmill for the Physiotherapy Room at St. Clare's Mercy Hospital.

WOMEN'S HEALTH services, such as obstetrical and gynecological care, are provided at the Women's and Child Health Centre, located in the Health Sciences Centre. This program also operates the province's only specialized, high-risk birthing unit.

- Purchase of a surgical operating table and anesthesia machine for the Case Room.
- Purchase of colposcopes for the Women's Health Clinics to help diagnose cervical cancer.



Working together . . .

To Provide Comfort in Care



Comfort in Care Grants

In 2008-2009, the Health Care Foundation's *Comfort in Care* Program distributed \$30,000 in grants to 19 units and division areas within the St. John's adult hospitals to provide items to enhance the care and comfort of patients. The *Comfort in Care* Program also awarded seven donations of medical products such as non-invasive blood pressure monitors and sleeper chairs.

Here are a few other examples of *Comfort in Care* grants purchased in 2008-2009.

FAMILY ROOM FURNISHINGS: When people are in hospital, they often take comfort in the presence of close family members. *Comfort in Care* grants were awarded to 4 hospital units to purchase sofas and furnishings for family rooms so that families will have more comfortable surroundings in their time of need.

RECREATION ITEMS FOR MENTAL HEALTH CLIENTS: *Comfort in Care* grants were awarded to the Waterford Hospital to provide recreation items, such as board games, art supplies, and Wii Sports systems to provide a better quality of life for patients in closed units who have few leisure opportunities.

SLEEPER CHAIRS: These chairs function as comfortable visitor chairs by day and fold out to beds at night so that family members or close friends may stay with a critically ill loved one during the night. *Comfort in Care* grants provided a total of 8 sleeper chairs for hospital in-patient units.

Achieving 'Comfort in Life'

A growing understanding of chronic pain and complex disability has led to the development of special rehabilitation programs that focus on the unique needs of people dealing with these issues. Newfoundland and Labrador is fortunate to have such a program. The Centre for Pain and Disability Management (CPDM), located at Southcott Hall next to the Dr. L.A. Miller Centre, has been providing a multi-faceted approach to pain management since 1990. Individuals who are accepted to the CPDM are admitted to a five-week, day hospital program. Participants learn ways to manage their pain and its effect on their lives.



Anne Mack, a recreation therapy specialist with the CPDM program, says, "Often people who have pain feel like they aren't able to have fun. At the program, we have a strong belief that leisure activities should be a priority as it can have a very positive impact on people's psychological well-being. We help reconnect participants with previously enjoyed pursuits or introduce them to new leisure and relaxation activities under the supervision of recreation specialist."

Anne successfully applied for a *Comfort in Care* grant to establish a Leisure Education and Exploration Room for the CPDM program. The grant funded items such as a sewing machine, a computer with internet access, relaxation CDs, and supplies and instructional resources for baking, scrapbooking, gardening, painting and woodworking activities. Anne says that these items are tremendously helpful in teaching people how to develop a new leisure lifestyle while managing their chronic pain symptoms.

Working together . . . With Our Health Care Professionals

Dear Staff of the Health Care Foundation,
Our staff was struggling to perform highly technical work in less than desirable work spaces. The labs, which were too warm in the summer and too cold in the winter, were noisy and cramped, and often had poor air quality. Paul Snow and Catherine Barrett met the dedicated women and men who work in the prosthetic and orthotics labs and immediately adopted this project with enthusiasm and vigor.

Today, through their partnership with Eastern Health and the generosity of a dedicated donor, the labs are larger, brighter and safer. Everything from the ventilation system to the windows, work stations and equipment have been replaced. This project would not have been realized without the involvement of the Foundation and a donor who understands the meaning of giving to help others. This redevelopment and expansion project has been instrumental to improving the quality of work life for staff. It will, undoubtedly, attract new employees and create efficiencies and more timely care for patients and clients.

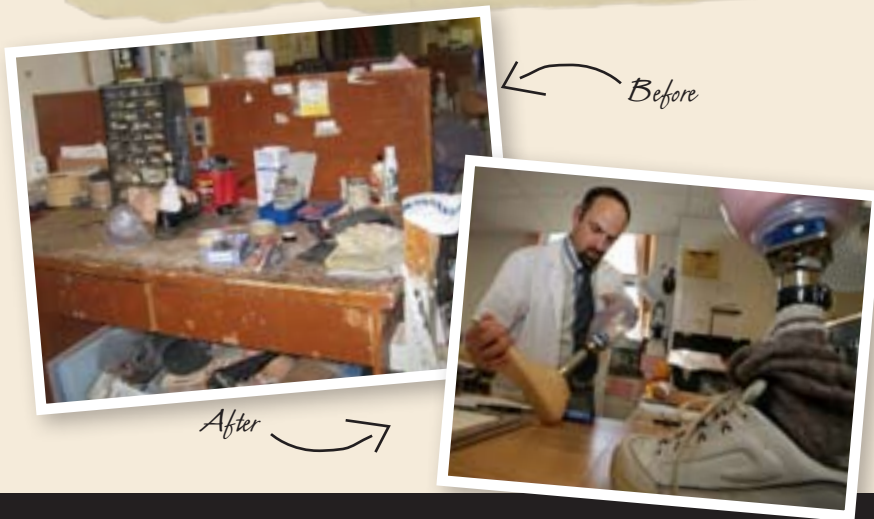

Working Together... For Better Rehabilitation Services

The Rehabilitation Technology Division is well hidden on the bottom floor of the Dr. L.A. Miller Centre in St. John's. Its workshop provides custom prosthetic, orthotic and adaptive devices, such as artificial limbs, braces, custom footwear and adaptive seating for thousands of people from across Newfoundland and Labrador.

When Elinor Gill Ratcliffe toured the Orthotics and Prosthetics workshop last year, the work area was almost exactly as it was when it was established 25 years ago. At that time, the working spaces and equipment were comparable to other sites across Canada. However, the field of Orthotics and Prosthetics has become very technologically advanced. In addition to traditional equipment such as drill presses and sanders, computers are now a required tool for providing orthotics and prosthetics services. New advances such as the C-Leg (computerized knee) and the Utha Arm (electronic elbow) are just a few of the innovative devices now provided to patients.

Ms. Gill Ratcliffe recognized that this was an area of healthcare that could benefit from her financial support. Her generous donation to the Health Care Foundation designated to the Orthotics and Prosthetics workshop enabled the renovations to finally proceed.



Working Together with Caring Donors

Elinor Gill Ratcliffe's Order of Newfoundland biography describes her as a "humanist, builder, dreamer, visionary and philanthropist." To the staff and patients of the Rehabilitation Technology Division, Elinor is a miracle worker who made their dream of a better facility come true. Elinor grew up in St. John's where she continues to maintain a home. In the 1970s she moved to Ontario, where she met her husband Edward. They shared a passion for helping the disadvantaged, a passion that she has continued since her husband's death in 2002. The Health Care Foundation is deeply grateful to Elinor Gill Ratcliffe for her support of healthcare.

General Hospital Auxiliary

Since its inception in 1968, the **General Hospital Auxiliary** has raised more than \$2.75 million for the General Hospital. With 40-50 actively involved volunteers, the Auxiliary raises the majority of its money through the operation of the General Hospital Gift Shop, located in the Health Sciences Centre. They also regularly hold raffles and bake sales. Funds raised are primarily spent on medical equipment; and in recent years, their support has provided for state-of-the-art equipment for Orthopedic Surgery and Cardiac Care. In addition to their monetary support, General Hospital Auxiliary members volunteer hundreds of hours visiting patients and their families.

Together with our proud supporters and Signature Sponsors, the Health Care Foundation hosted the 21st *Eleganza* on Saturday, November 22, 2008, at the Delta St. John’s Hotel. Presented by Bell Aliant, *Eleganza* 2008 took us on a journey through Egypt for a magical Night on the Nile. Amidst towering pyramids and glittering jewels, an outstanding \$172,500 in net proceeds was raised to support our provincial Cardiac Care Program.

Through the years, we have cultivated long-standing relationships with individuals and organizations committed to advancing health care in our province. Over the past 21 years, more than \$1.5 million has been raised cumulatively from this event to support patient care at the adult hospital sites in St. John’s.

Champions of Mental Health

In the 1940s, at a time when mental illness was rarely acknowledged and psychiatric patients were shunned, the Caribou Group of the Rotary Club of St. John’s chose the Hospital for Mental & Nervous Diseases (later renamed the Waterford Hospital) as their charity of choice. The Caribou Group have been strong financial supporters of the hospital, and most importantly, they have given generously of their time by organizing patient activities such as dances, boat rides, bingo, BBQs and operating the canteen. The group spearheaded the construction of the Waterford Chapel, and also established a rehabilitation workshop and a greenhouse to provide occupational therapy. Most recently, the Caribou Group donated \$10,000 to refit the gymnasium to provide fitness facilities for Waterford patients. This exemplary group of volunteers has truly lived up to the Rotary motto of *Service Above Self*.



Working together . . . To Support Colorectal Cancer Research

Health Care Foundation awards a \$10,000 research grant to develop a Colorectal Cancer Fresh Tissue Biobank.

Newfoundland has the highest rate of colorectal cancer in Canada and the highest proportion of familial cases in the world. Researcher Dr. Michael Woods is studying the genes of Newfoundlanders with a family history of colorectal cancer, as up to 35% of cases may be hereditary in origin.

Dr. Woods and his fellow researchers at Memorial University have collaborated with surgeons and pathologists at Eastern Health to establish a Fresh Frozen Tissue Biobank of colorectal cancer tumours. The purpose of this project is to create and maintain a comprehensive tumour bank of samples of individuals' normal, malignant and marginal tissue that will permit researchers to study tumours that have been cryogenically preserved and which can be stored indefinitely without compromising DNA quality.

The research team received a \$10,000 Health Care Foundation Health Research Grant to maintain the work of the fresh frozen tissue bank for colorectal cancer. The grant provided the team with resources to buy a transportable liquid nitrogen tank that is used to ship the samples from city hospitals to the lab at Memorial University. The grant also provided the necessary resources and materials to prepare the tumour tissue immediately following removal during surgery and to process tissue samples once received by the lab staff.

To date there are more than 120 tumour samples cryogenically preserved and stored in Dr. Wood's lab. Dr. Woods says, "My team sincerely thanks the Health Care Foundation for its support. Without these funds we would not have continued this project in the last year."



The Health Care Foundation funded 10 health research projects in 2008-2009. Here are examples of other projects funded:

- Searching for novel rare HFE mutations for HFE, associated hereditary hemochromatosis in the NL population (Dr. Y. Xie).
- The Impact of Medical Residents' exposure to Electronic Medical Records (Dr. Gerard Farrell).
- Identifying if Vitamin D deficiency or insufficiency in early pregnancy is associated with maternal adverse health outcomes (Dr. L. Newhook).

Working together . . . To Support Staff Education

Nicholas Nash - Scholarship Recipient

They say life comes full circle, and that has certainly been the case for Nicholas Nash, a Social Worker with the In-patient Adult Rehabilitation unit at the Dr. L.A. Miller Centre. Nicholas grew up in Branch and left school in grade nine to work in the local fish plant and help out his family. At the age of 20, his life was forever changed when a car accident severed his spinal cord, leaving him paralysed from the waist down. Nicholas spent five months at the Rehabilitation Unit at the Miller Centre where he began the process of adjusting to his disability.

In the ensuing years, Nicholas set a goal of finishing high school and becoming a counselor for others with disabilities. He graduated with a Bachelor of Social Work in 1999 and worked in several positions before landing his "dream job" as a Social Worker at the Rehabilitation Unit,

where he counsels patients who are in similar situations to what he has personally experienced.

Nicholas applied for a Health Care Foundation Staff Scholarship in 2008 to help fund his Masters Level program in Social Work. He was chosen as one of five candidates who received a \$2000 scholarship from this fund. He hopes to graduate with his Masters in Social Work in the fall of 2010. Nicholas is deeply grateful for the funding. He says, "I was so pleased to have the opportunity to take these courses and to participate in advanced clinical practice. It has taken my counseling skills to a higher level and it will certainly benefit patients of this unit. In addition, my wife was pregnant during my courses and we now have a three-month old child. Having the financial support to continue my education was a big relief for me."

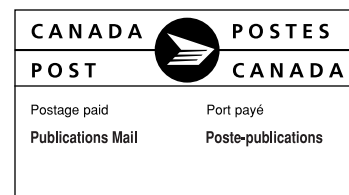
